STUDENT CHOICES



This fall CVS was invited to participate again in the Otsego Community Foundations Student Voices, Student Choices Competition. This year's program started off with a work day at Hartwick College where students engaged with teams from all participating schools to learn about the process of researching and developing plans surrounding community problems, and partnering with nonprofits. It was at that workday that this year's team of students from the National Honor Society was able to isolate the issue that they wanted to tackle. Hygiene poverty, an issue that students at our school and all schools in our area deal with on a daily basis. They also selected the Cherry Valley Food Pantry as the nonprofit they wanted to partner with. Upon returning

back to CVS the student group set to work, researching and developing a plan that would not only be effective to address the problem but one that students and community members would feel comfortable and welcome using as hygiene poverty has a huge stigma. Over the course of many work periods and time together the HQ became the plan.

Presenting their community issue and plan to tackle it on November 20 to a group of panelists, in front of family, friends, peers and the community at Hartwick College. The competition was nothing short of amazing, as every school had a project that addressed community issues that their group felt was worthy of time and attention. One of the incredible parts of the Student Voices, Student Choices

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Competition is that every school receives at least \$1000 towards the project they have developed- Everyone, every community wins! As results were announced and CVS had not yet been announced, we were excited to be a contender for one of the top prizes, but it wasn't just any prize we were awarded, but the Grand Prize of \$5000!

Our students have now shared their vision for the HQ-The place to go for what you need, with their peers at a 7-12 assembly on January 5th as we returned from break. The HQ will not only have hygiene items, but also household products and gently used clothing, winter gear, etc. The HQ will be accessible to all students through a group of trusted adults selected by the team. Additionally, the School Based Health Center staff will also have access, when community members are at the SBHC with their child and a

need is recognized, staff can open the room to that family. The HQ is completely anonymous and allows students, and community members to select items needed in their home without the stigmas and in an atmosphere that mirrors a shopping experience.

Now the real work begins! The student group is already working on the next steps and plans to have the HQ open at the start of this coming school year, an ambitious but achievable goal with our nonprofit partner- The Cherry Valley Food Pantry. Keep an eye out for more information as the HQ comes to life, we look forward to sharing it with everyone in September 2024 at the annual open house night.

December 7 was the ribbon cutting for the School-Based Health Center. What an exciting day! Erin Williams and Ethan Sheldon give thank you cards signed by both the elementary and secondary students to Ginny Hastings, a generous donor to the SBHC.

School Based Health Center

Cherry Valley-Springfield Central School District is proud to share that our new School-Based Health Center (SBHC) has had a great first two months. Since our ribbon-cutting in early December, we have enrolled more than 100 students, which is over 20% of our school population. We are very pleased with this strong start and ready to enroll more! To that end, we wanted to provide some important details for families who may still be undecided about whether our SBHC is the right fit for your student and family.

First, although providing primary and preventive medical, dental, and mental health services right in the school is a new concept for many of us in this district, it's a tried-and-true healthcare model. Schools across the country started pioneering SBHCs in the 1960's, and Bassett Healthcare Network's program just celebrated its 30th anniversary. The program has grown in that time (ours is Bassett's 22nd SBHC) and has earned recognition for providing access to high quality care—for example, they are recognized by the National Committee for Quality Assurance as a Patient-Centered Medical Home.

The benefits of enrolling your child in School-Based Health are broad. Perhaps the most basic is the convenience: parents don't need to use personal time or lose work hours to drive students to appointments for regular checkups, follow-ups, mental health counseling, or dental work. Perhaps the most important is the cost savings. The SBHC will bill students' health insurance for all services provided, including physical examinations, but no family will ever have to pay out-of-pocket for any service provided at the SBHC. Any

additional costs not covered by insurance are covered by the School-Based Health Program. If your child already has another pediatrician, the SBHC team can also work with that practitioner if care is needed in school.

There are other benefits that, for some families, can be the most important. Students attending health appointments using a hall pass rather than a half-day absence from school helps reduce the academic impact of an illness or injury. Bassett also has telehealth arrangements with pediatric specialists at the University of Rochester who can help treat rare cases of illness—asthma, for example—making specialized appointments much easier to arrange.

Whatever enrollment choice you make, remember that our SBHC will be able to handle various needs—like physical exams needed for sports or working papers—regardless of whether or not a student is enrolled. Plus, our school nurse's office will still be available for all the services it is now.

School-Based Health Centers begin teaching children about the importance of good health habits and responsibility that lasts a lifetime. We are pleased to partner with Bassett Healthcare Network to offer this critical service to you and your family!

Peer Conflict vs Meanness vs Bullying

Helping School Communities, Parents & Staff Identify the Key Differences

Sometimes people think that **peer conflict**, **meanness** and **bullying** are the same thing, but they aren't. Peer conflict is a part of everyday experience, which we navigate the complexities of how we interact. Knowing what to look for and learning strategies to handle bullying are crucial for staff members in order to create a positive school culture. Review the comparison below to understand the key differences:

	Definition:	Behavior:	Example:
Peer Conflict	Peer conflict is an argument or disagreement in where both sides express their opposing views.	Equal power between those involved. Generally feels remorse and will change behavior when they realize it is hurting someone.	Ethan and Amy were playing hide and seek and Ethan finds Amy. She accuses Ethan of cheating with his eyes open and an argument ensues.
Meanness	Meanness can be subjective and can be motivated by angry feelings and/or being socially rude (i.e. bluntness). It is not a frequent occurrence.	Equal power between those involved. A one-off situation where the behavior may have the intent to hurt, but nobody else is pulled into the conflict.	Mary tells Anthony that he can't play four square during recess because he is the worst player in the whole third grade.
Bullying	Bullying has the goal to continuously hurt, harm or humiliate with emotional or physical aggression/threats towards a targetted victim(s).	The person who is bullying misuses their power (i.e. older, stronger, popular, etc) and continues behavior when they realize it is hurting someone.	Dan has joined the Computer Club so John calls him a "geek". John also then convinces the other kids in their group to call him "geek".

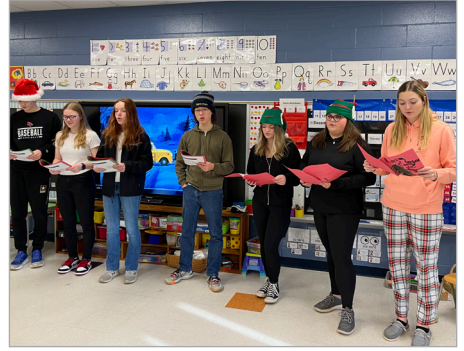
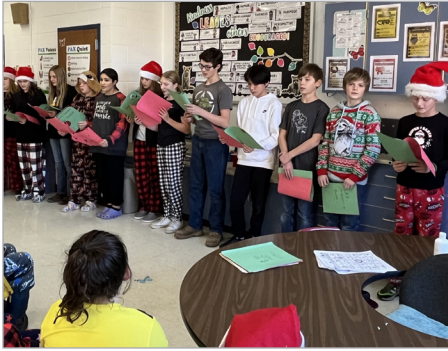

Water Bottles

We have noticed more students using CIRKUL water bottles. We have also been seeing an increase in hyperactivity and disruptive behaviors. With this in mind the Wellness Committee has done some research into the CIRKUL cartridge contents. Despite the products being sugar free, with no artificial colors or flavorings, some of these are the equivalent of energy drinks, have artificial sweeteners (sucralose or stevia) and/or have added caffeine. As a reminder students are not allowed to have energy drinks in school or at school sponsored activities such as athletics, field trips, drama club, etc. per the parent letter from Ms. Snyder dated 12/1/2022.

Please review the contents of the cartridges that your child is using in their CIRKUL and refrain from use of the energy drink cartridges when in school and consider opting for non-caffeinated cartridges when in school.

Thank you for your assistance with promoting water and healthy options for your child.

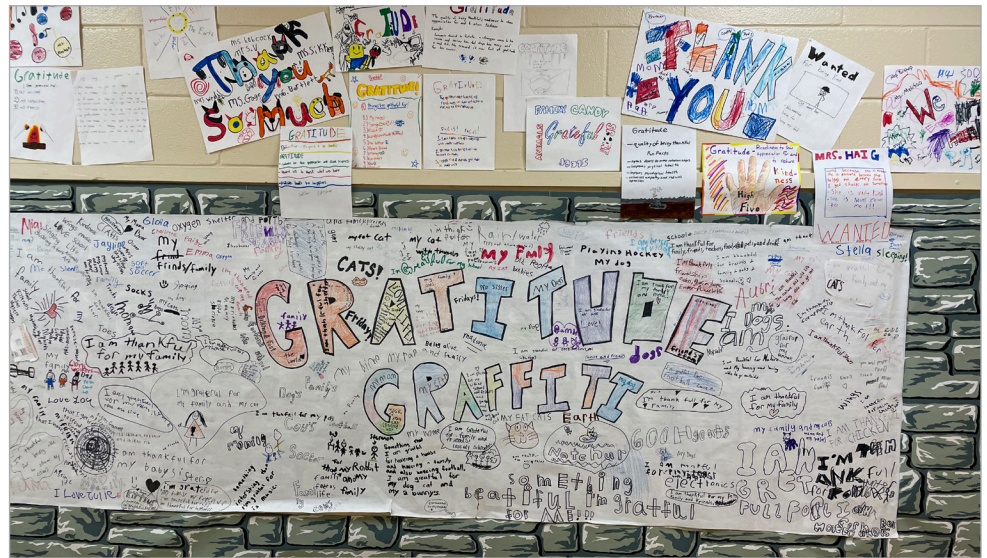


Art News

Being a Head Coach is HARD Work. Here are 9 Things Coaches Want Parents to Understand

- 1: **We CARE about your Child** Even if your child doesn't get much playing time, we care about them. Nothing is ever personal. We love your child. Everyone has a Role. They are all different. But they are all important. Help us celebrate their role.
- 2: **TIME** There are only two people who understand the time commitment of a coach. The Coach and their Spouse. We are always "on," constantly thinking about our team. We sacrifice our Family time to be with your child. We don't need a pat on the back. Just respect this fact.
- 3: **We LOVE this job.** But it is a hard job. Please don't steal our Joy. Our Passion. Our Commitment. We are losing too many coaches. Help Support us.
- 4: **Coaches want to WIN more than you do.** We are very competitive. We put our heart and soul into this job. We are not perfect. Neither are you. No one is. Strategy or X's and O's matter much less than you think. We are at practice every day. Trust what we see and do.
- 5: **Everything is EARNED.** You get what you earn. Don't blame the coach. Encourage your child to be committed. It is your child's job to get in the weight room, shoot in the driveway, go to the gym or field, etc. Encourage them to do this. You get what you earn.
- 6: **Trust the PROCESS** Team Sports are the ultimate lab setting for life. There will be bumps in the road. It is guaranteed. It is part of the process. Accept this fact. Trust the Process. The life lessons learned will last a lifetime.
- 7: **Winning is HARD.** Other teams want to win too. Other teams put time in too. Other teams compete too. The season is a grind, and the process is more important than the prize. Learning how to win . . . and how to lose . . . is an important part of this process.
- 8: **Your child GETS it.** Your child understands. They are at every practice. They know their strengths. They know their weaknesses. They know their role. Don't feed their youthful insecurities by questioning the coach. This will hurt their experience and the team.
- 9: **Finally, and Most Importantly, this is your child's experience, not yours.** This is important. Let them enjoy the experience with your support. Don't judge them. Don't be critical. Just be there. Tell them you LOVE watching them play. Be a fan of the TEAM
