After-School Movie a Big Success



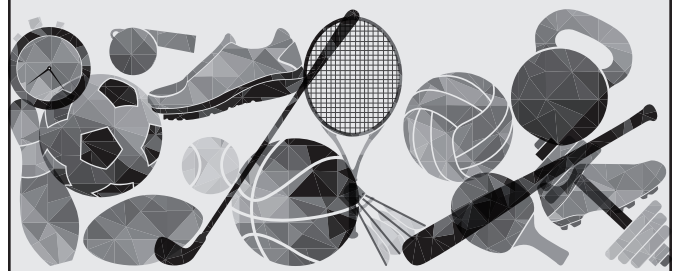

Here are a few reminders

- There is no more charging; please put money in your child's lunch account or send cash.
- All charges must be paid by the end of the school year.
- You can check your child's lunch account by going to the school website and clicking lunch accounts.
- You can also pay online by going to the school website and clicking lunch accounts.
- For the new 2017-2018 school year if you receive SNAP or Medicaid you are eligible for free meals without sending in an application. You should receive a letter around the end of August or beginning of September from the cafeteria stating that you are automatically eligible. If you do not receive a letter stating that you are approved please call Holly in the cafeteria right away.
- You may apply or reapply at any time during the school year. If your income changes at all during the year please send in an application right away to see if you might qualify for free or reduced meals. Also please remember that the whole school benefits from the free and reduced program. There are a lot of grants that we would qualify for.

Head Start

Did You Know: Cherry Valley-Springfield has a Head Start (HS)/Early Head Start (EHS) program? HS/EHS is a program that works with income-eligible families from pregnancy through when the child is ready for kindergarten. EHS is a home based program that focuses on healthy prenatal outcomes, as well as working with children from infancy to three years old. HS is a preschool program that helps build the foundation for the child to become successful throughout their educational career. HS/EHS provides children with speech and language skills, problem solving skills, music and movement activities, creative arts activities, health and nutrition activities, and completes health screening throughout the program year. HS/EHS also has opportunities for parents and family to get involved with the program. The program has leadership opportunities, resources, and referral services for all program families.

Congratulations to **Noah Young** and **Marcus Mosenson**! In March, both young artists submitted their portfolio to the New York State Summer School of the Arts.

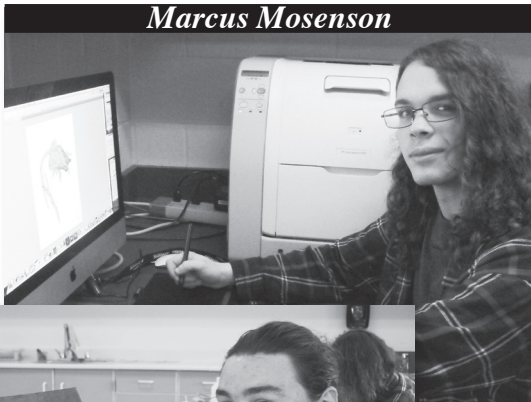

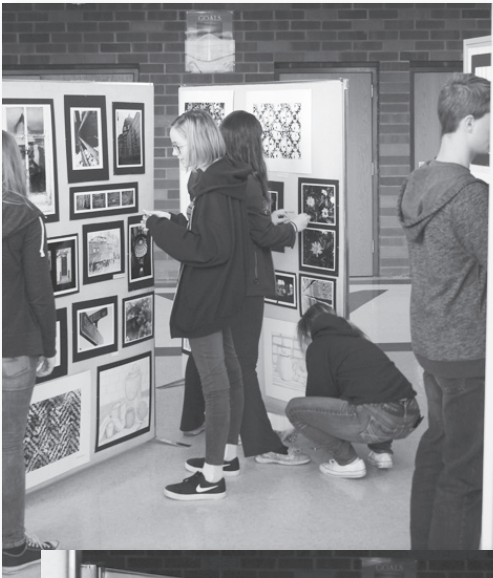
The *Blue Skies Smilin' at Me* Exhibit will be on display at the Fenimore Art Museum until May 29. The exhibit then moves to Five Star Subaru in Oneonta for a three month show. In November, Jose Herzog's piece titled *A Dangerous Game*, Meagan Wilmot's piece titled *What Matters Most* and Natalie Davis's piece titled *The Gambling Machine* will continue their journey and will be showcased at the New York State Council on Problem Gambling Statewide Convention. Quilt Blocks in the Middle School

Recently, the Studio Art 1 class and some Advanced Art students joined together to design and paint a permanent exhibit for the upper middle school wing. The art display consist of 10 quilt block designs. Within the display there are four main sections that organize the quilt patterns through color and design. As one views the public art display they will travel through monochromatic, primary, analogous, and complementary color schemes. The students involved in this project from the Studio Art 1 class were **Luke Bartlet, Morgan Collins, Rylee Dea, Aidan Delaney, Valissa Douglas, Kathleen Dove, Kelsey Girard, Matthew Kroll, Phillip Kubis, Alana Latella-Devine, Kendra McGovern, Felicia VanBuren, Kearny Warner, Silas Wilson and Austin Yerdon**. The Advanced students that helped out were **Skyler Girard, Kathleen Jacoby, Avalon Kubis, Hailey Diani, Althea Prime and Joey Whittle**. All of them worked in teams of six for the design and color theory, but split into groups of two for mapping out the design and painting on the wood.

The painting technique they used was a Hard Edge art technique utilized primarily in the 1960's to ensure sharp geometric shapes and crisp edges. The Quilt Project incorporated many disciplines. First the students worked in the computer lab researching the history and a variety of quilt patterns. The students then created their initial designs and color schemes using Adobe Photoshop. Next, was to draw the Quilt Design to scale. The students used their math skills which involved grid and angle measurements and drew their designs on a 4' x 4' piece of plywood. The idea for this project came about due to the fact that quilting has a very rich history and they are becoming popular as decorative art forms displayed on the outside of buildings throughout the area. The quilt designs will add a nice warm touch to the Middle School Wing. The Art Department would like to extend a special thank you to P.I.E., Bruce Hall Corporation, Haggerty Ace Hardware, the CV-S Technology Department, and the custodial staff in helping us to make The Quilt Project possible.
